Stating your faith

In the past two sessions, we've looked at what belief is and why it's important, and we've seen how our *Book of Confessions* translates our Christian beliefs into the language of specific times and contexts. Putting it together

Now, as you'll probably notice, very few (if any) statements of faith are merely lists of "I believe" declarations. They're crafted into paragraphs, and tend to follow some sort of narrative structure. So, as you form your statements into *a* statement, consider the following questions:

- Where do you want to start? Which of your beliefs lays the foundation for your others?
- How might you transition from one topic to another? What logical progression might you follow?
- What overall message (what "why") do you want to convey with this statement? How might you craft all your descriptions around that message?
- Where do you want to end? What idea do you want to leave people with?

Remember, this is a *rough draft*. It neither needs to be, nor *will* it be, perfect. Just start crafting, and you may be pleasantly surprised with what you end up with.
